Comments

Focus

- The essay is about 2 essays; both are from the "Room for Debate" collection(s) we've discussed in class.
- There is a clear focus to the essay. Can you explain, in one sentence, what the thesis is?

Comments

Incorporating Textual Evidence

- Uses specific evidence from the assigned texts.
- Signal phrases are varied and well written. There are no quotations without a signal phrase.
- Essay makes effective use of "Intro-Quote-Restate-Relate" model
- Parenthetical citations are correctly formatted. There are no quotations that need a citation added.

Comments

Analysis (general)

- Quotations and paraphrases are used appropriately.
- Only the most relevant and important details from the texts are included.
- Presents a clear, focused *interpretation* of those details. (Not just summary.)

Comments

Analysis (rhetorical)

- Provides examples of each essay's use of pathos and argues which is stronger.
- Provides examples of each essay's use of logos and argues which is stronger.
- Compares the ethos of each author and argues which is stronger.

Comments

Organization (Chapter 2 of BTD)

Beginning

- Opening paragraph captures the reader's attention and provides a sense of what the essay is about.

Unity: Paragraphs

- Each paragraph has a clear, easy-to-identify topic sentence.
- Each paragraph makes a specific point (contained in the topic sentence)
- Each paragraph is logically connected to and develops support for the main idea of the essay

Coherence

- The order in which the paragraphs are arranged is appropriate
- The paragraphs are logically connected to each other
- The reader is carried from one paragraph to the next by transitional words or phrases
